Keeping you up to date with developments

Introduction by Chairman Sukhdev Sharma • WELCOME to the third issue of Foundation News.

Our newsletter aims to keep you up to date with new developments and information about your hospitals, and will be one of our regular ways of keeping in contact with you.

First delivery for Centre:

Since becoming a Foundation Trust in August 2006 we have further strengthened our already established links with the local community.

Our council members are actively involved in areas of interest, and are working closely with staff to improve

and develop hospital services.

I hope that this newsletter gives you a feel for what has been going on behind the scenes and that you will continue to work with us to improve and modernise services for local people.

New Birth Centre offers state-of-the-art facilities









AFTER five months of hard work the Huddersfield Family Birth Centre opened its doors to women at 7am on March 10.

Half of ward 14 at Huddersfield Royal Infirmary has been entirely redeveloped into a modern centre for women and their partners, which is completely different to a traditional hospital ward.

It has six rooms, including one with a birth pool, and they are all en-suite. There are facilities for partners to stay overnight and a communal kitchen and quiet/prayer room.

The new birth centre will provide a more relaxed environment for women and their partners. It is an ideal option for healthy women with uncomplicated pregnancies who

do not want or need to have their baby in a more high-tech unit.

Helen Shallow, the Trust's consultant midwife, said: "This a really exciting time for local women and for the Trust too.

"The reaction we have had from people who have seen the centre has been extremely positive and we hope that others share our excitement and enthusiasm too."

For the first few months it will run alongside the delivery suite and post-natal ward (ward 14) at HRI and later in 2008 when maternity services move to Calderdale, the Huddersfield Family Birth Centre will become a freestanding unit for the women and families of Huddersfield.

The options

Women in Calderdale and Huddersfield have a range of options open to them when thinking about where to have their baby:

- Home birth
- Huddersfield Family Birth Centre
- The delivery suite and ward 14 at Huddersfield Royal Infirmary (open until mid-2008)
- The midwife-led unit at Calderdale Royal Hospital
 The Labour, Delivery, Recovery and Post-natal
- [LDRP] Suite at Calderdale Royal Hospital

Later this year some of the final Looking to the Future service changes will take place. These will include centralising obstetrics services (consultant – led maternity care), services for babies needing special care and inpatient paediatrics (for children who need to stay at least one night) at Calderdale Royal Hospital.

OCTOBER

Double top-rating

The Trust was one of only three organisations in the Yorkshire and Humber region to achieve a double excellent rating by the Healthcare Commission. The quality of services provided at the Trust was rated as excellent – placing us in the top fifth of acute hospitals in the country. We were also rated as excellent for use of our resources.

NOVEMBER

New operating theatre opens



The new £250,000 laminar-flow operating theatre at Calderdale Royal Hospital opened on November 16 and is helping to cut waiting lists.

The theatre is primarily being used for joint replacement surgery as it provides an ultra-clean environment. The laminar-flow canopy renews the air around the table approximately 500 times an hour providing the most sterile conditions for surgery and minimising the risk of infection.

The theatre, which is the third of its type at the hospital, will be for orthopaedic surgery.

Going greener!



The Trust launched a green campaign – 10% less – in a pledge to cut its carbon emissions even further, working in partnership with Kirklees Primary Care Trust, Calderdale Primary Care Trust and the South West Yorkshire Mental Health Trust.

As part of the leading edge initiative, the Trust has introduced innovations including the installation of special photo-voltaic cells, which convert daylight into energy, on the flat roof at Huddersfield Royal Infirmary.

A NEW consultant specialising in children's emergencies and 11 new nurses have boosted the A&E team at Calderdale Royal Hospital

The unit, which sees around 70,000 patients a year, now has a team of 53 nurses and three consultants covering all specialties.

New consultant Paul Jarvis, married with two children, joins the team from Leeds General Infirmary where he was a locum consultant. Before that he was a specialist registrar in emergency medicine in Yorkshire with experience in anaesthetics, A&E, orthopaedics and paediatrics.

He is a graduate of Leeds University medical school and prior to that he graduated with a first class honours degree in pathological sciences

Developing services

PLANNING for the future is vitally important at the Trust and each year detailed work takes place to set priorities for the months ahead.

This work looks at things such as the development of new services for the people of Calderdale and Huddersfield.

Each council member has taken a special interest in an area of the Trust, which is divided into four clinical divisions:

- Children's and women's services
- Surgery and anaesthetics
- Medicine and elderly Diagnostics and therapeutics

The council members sit on divisional groups where they meet with senior clinicians and managers. They are also involved in divisional

focus groups on specific issues. Often there are issues where the extra input from members can help, for example:

Pharmacy

The pharmacy at Huddersfield Royal Infirmary is in need of refurbishment and some members have put their names forward to help out with the planning work in the near future.

X-rays and diagnostics

Some members of the Trust have been invited to help the diagnostics and therapeutics division look at ways of improving patient access to investigations such as scans and X-rays, which they might need before seeing a consultant or doctor.

- Do not visit if you are unwell you should be free of any symptoms (eg sickness and diarrhoea) for at least two days before you visit • Do not sit on the patient's bed.
- Please use the chairs provided Do not touch patients' wounds,



bandages and dressings or medical equipment such as drips

 Patients should have their own toiletries and should never borrow from other patients.

Travel survey helps Trust plan for the future

A TRAVEL survey has been carried out by council members and Trust staff to find out how some of our visitors get to Huddersfield Royal Infirmary.

The survey took place in January and council members Peter Naylor, Jan Roberts, Dot Rayner, Janette Roberts and Lesley Longbottom handed out short forms during visiting hours in children's and women's areas. The forms asked visitors how they had travelled to the hospital, if they used public transport, where they travelled from and the times they travelled at.

Janette Roberts said: "The majority of people questioned stated that they had travelled to the hospital by car, as this was the most convenient mode of travel. Interest was shown in the shuttle service and information and timetables were handed-out to the public."

Alison Lovatt assistant director of children and women's services, and a member of the Trust's Transport Group, said: "It is important we talk directly to visitors to understand the implications of the changes and what we can do to help.

The survey is part of work going on behind the scenes to plan for the next stage of service reorganisation. Many services have already moved but later this year the final stages will take place with consultant-led maternity care and in-patient children's services moving to Calderdale Royal Hospital

THE POPULAR Medicine for Members events are continuing this year - a great chance for you to meet our staff and find out more about the issues that really interest you.

Themes over the coming months include developments in cancer care, care of the elderly and 'you and your heart'.

The recent 'alcohol and you' events gave members advice about safe levels of drinking. Dr Sally-Anne Wilson, a consultant in accident and emergency, asked some members to pour what they thought was a single unit of different types of alcohol – with varied results! She said many of the large

glasses of wine now available in pubs and bars were the equivalent of about three units. Dr Wilson also described some of the negative effects of too much drink dealt with in A&E.

Ashwin Verma, a consultant gastroenterologist, described some of the detrimental effects of too much alcohol on the body, including liver damage and the increased risk of breast cancer. He also told members that drinking within safe limits would not do any physical or psychological harm.

During the question and answer session some members said it would be useful if there was a mark or line

on pub glasses indicating how many units they contained. Others said the retail trade encouraged drinking with offers such as "two for one.

There has been a great deal of positive feedback from all the Medicine for Members events as well as some useful ideas on how they can be improved or future topics for discussion.

Top ratings for maternity services

Maternity services at the Trust were awarded the highest possible rating in a new national survey. We were the only Trust in West Yorkshire to gain the "best performing" rating from the independent Healthcare Commission. The rating puts the Trust in the top 26 per cent nationally.

Heart study launched

Our Trust is taking part in a major international study to test a new drug combination to cut cardiovascular disease We are one of 55 Trusts in the UK taking part in a fiveyear study, called HPS2-THRIVE (Treatment of HDL to Reduce the Incidence of Vascular Events). The study is being co-ordinated by the Clinical Trial Service Unit at the University of Oxford.

FEBRUARY

Deep clean underway



Work has started on an intensive cleaning programme at our hospitals as part of a national deep clean initiative. Working with the Calderdale and Kirklees Primary Care Trusts we have agreed a programme, which will be completed by the end of March.

The work is in addition to the regular cleaning that takes place in our hospitals and is part of our ongoing programme to tackle infection control.

New X-ray machine

machine has been installed by the radiology department for the A&E department at Huddersfield Royal Infirmary.

The orthopantomogram (OPT) is designed for oral and facial X-ray images. The machine will be used for diagnostic purposes on a daily basis by the radiology department on patients referred from the Maxillofacial Unit. Referrals for OPT examinations will also be sent from the accident and emergency department in cases of facial trauma to detect injuries such as fractured jaws.

More than 60 patients a week will be referred from the Maxillofacial clinic to undergo X-rays on the machine as well as patients referred from A&E. The Maxillofacial clinic also takes referrals from other departments including GPs and dentists, but does not offer routine dental treatment.


