In the 20 years I have been here there have been so many changes but the care remains the same. All the wonderful staff provide a wonderful service and this new place will help them to continue with their magnificent work."

The team is made up of 10 members who work across the community, involving working with complex patients with long term conditions and who are identified at risk of hospital admission.

The team help individuals with self-management plans and aim to improve their quality of life.

One of the targets is to have less than 10% of the caseload attending A&E. The latest results show only 1.9% attending A&E. To achieve this, the team work with the Virtual ward, hospital discharge teams and GP practices to identify patients at risk of admission.

Each patient under their care will have an individualised emergency



care plan. The plans are also aimed to inform paramedics, and in some cases the paramedics will call the team for advice in order to make reductions in admissions.

Clinical Lead Andrea Beevers said: "We support our patient's journey and rather than the patient experiencing a fragmented service, we aim to make it as seamless as possible". Alan Johnson said: "We are a very close team, supportive of each other. We are quite unique in that we are autonomous practitioners, coordinating and liaising with other professionals to provide a high standard of quality care. We are also developing a 'Knowledge Portal' online to promote and share knowledge and skills with other clinicians to promote improvements in practice and care".

It Asda be our Calderdale Community Midwives...

Our community midwives from CRH are holding a 'Meet the Midwives' event on November 6th to make people more aware of the clinic they run at Halifax's Asda.

The event aims to promote community midwifery, services & other support services that are available, as well as focusing on some health services.

During the event, the midwives will have an antenatal and postnatal drop in session which will also involve specialist midwives.

Tommy's charity, which funds research into stillbirth, premature birth and miscarriage, have collaborated with our community midwives to work alongside them at the event.







News Round-up

Trust consultant delivers lecture

Emergency consultant Dr Paul Jarvis delivered two lectures at the the Royal College of Emergency Medicine (EM) 2015 Annual Scientific Conference.

It was a sell-out, held in Manchester last month with a central theme '24 Hour Emergency Medicine People: the Specialty That Never Sleeps'.

Dr Jarvis's lectures covered Point of Care Testing (POCT) which is the terminology for the analysing of blood tests at patient's bedside rather than in the hospital centralised laboratory.

The facility is now available in both

Emergency department sites within our Trust.

POCT is used across other Trusts, but our Trust is the first in the UK to use it to such an extent in the emergency department.

Our Eye Clinic Liaison Officer who provides support for patients with eye conditions at HRI has won a top national award.

Alice Elliott, based in Acre Mills has won the Macular Society's Support and Community Rehabilitation Professional of the Year Award.

Alice, on an honorary contract with the Trust from Action for Blind People, supports adults and children and their families after a diagnosis and she advises on benefits and entitlements and school matters for younger patients. She receives up to 40 new



referrals every month.
She said: "People react in many different ways to a diagnosis, especially if it has come as a shock. Younger people of working age in particular are in need of support especially if
