Obe was diagnosed last summer and his friends in theatres went all out to make his final months extra special.

poorly to leave the house, and raised money for air fares so his family could come to the UK from his homeland of South Africa and so Obe's body could be returned there for his funeral.

Obe, described as "a true gentleman" and "an inspiration to many people" sadly died on January 11, and is very much missed.

### **Consultation closes**



AFTER a three-day extension, the public consultation into proposed changes – Right Care, Right Time, Right Place – about hospital and community care closed on Friday, June 25 at 5pm. All responses will now be analysed by independent assessors and then the CCGs will work the Joint Overview and Scrutiny Committees (OSCs) to decide on the next steps.

As part of the this the OSCs have set up two new drop-ins on Thursday, July 7 (4-7pm) Huddersfield Town Hall and Tuesday, July 12, (4-5pm) Halifax Town Hall

Throughout the 14-week consultation a range of information sessions were held at CHFT and across our communities and CHFT colleagues attended alongside CCG colleagues to explain the reasons behind the proposals.

Pictured are our CEO Owen Williams, our clinical head of emergency care Dr Mark Davies and associate director of nursing Jo Middleton at the second public meeting. Jo Middleton said she backed the proposals

because she believed people waiting for planned care deserved their care as much as patients waiting for emergency care – and received a round of applause for her words.

She told how it was her role to call patients – who, with their families, had prepared for a date for surgery – only to tell them their operations are off as patients with emergency conditions need their beds.

Mark Davies said what is crucial for emergency patients is that their care starts when an ambulance picks them up and is not delayed until arrival at the emergency centre.

Head of Operations at Yorkshire Ambulance Service Andy Simpson, said ambulance crews were used to getting through traffic in rush hours in Bradford city centre and on the Leeds ring road, and driving on the Elland bypass at Salterhebble with a blue light is no different.

Owen stated the national picture saying the said the NHS nationally was in a financial position it had never been in before.

## What our patients think of us

BETTER at patient privacy on the wards and in A&E and better at hand hygiene! The results of the annual Inpatient Survey 2015 are out.

In most areas scored CHFT stayed the same but we are pleased to report improvements in the two key areas above scoring in the high 9s out of 10.

Each year all acute and specialist NHS Trusts participate in a survey of adult inpatients.

This year the survey was sent to 1220 patients discharged from a CRH or HRI inpatient ward in July 2015, of these 552 responded, giving a response rate of 45%

Patients were asked about their experience of:

- Were hand-wash gels available for patients and visitors to use? Scoring 9.8
- Were you given enough privacy
- when being examined or treated on the ward? Scoring 9.7 • The Trust was also noted to have made a statistically significant increase since last year in the scores for 2 of the questions: Were you given enough privacy
- when being examined or treated in the A&E department? Scoring 9.1 How clean were the toilets and bathrooms that you used

in hospital? Scoring 9.0

The results will be further analysed by the Trust's Health Informatics team, including a review of any comments supplied by patients. This will be reviewed by the Patient Experience and Caring Group who will be responsible for identifying any improvement work required.



# Teaching teenagers to be body-aware

**COLLEAGUES** have been out giving talks at schools this month, passing on important information to pupils and parents.

Our health visitor, Lisa Delaney, has been out promoting Vitamin D supplementation to children and their parents at Beech Hill School in Halifax.

The aim of it is to help children settle into their school environment in the term before they are due to start - this includes attending with parents so the children can get an idea of what is to give whilst having the opportunity to start building relationships with the school.

And in a brand new development for CHFT, our colleagues been to a secondary school in Halifax to talk to teenagers about the importance of checking their bodies.

The "Checkemlads" spoke to the boys about testicular cancers, and a representative from the Teenage Cancer Trust spoke to the girls about signs and symptoms and how lifestyle choices can cause cancer.

The pupils were between 14-15 year olds, and CHFT went in at the invitation of the school and the day was supported by CHFT's Urology CNS'S Miriam Slade and Shawna Doyle.

## # hello my name is... Ian Kilroy, Security and Emergency Preparedness Manager

"I was born and bred in Manchester and subjected to the school of inner city life...Now living very happily, on the other side of the Pennines in Burnley, Lancashire with my wife and three teenage children and importantly the family Border Terrier dog 'Princess Maggie'...

#### What is your position?

Trust Security and Emergency Preparedness Manager. Two main themes to the role; I am responsible for providing advice and technical guidance, developing and implementing risk based strategies to manage security risk activities within the corporate security portfolio for the organisation.

This means topics like lone working, violence and aggression, asset protection, Police liaison and physical security of Trust premises and people. Separately, but connected in some ways, emergency preparedness looks at Trust wide incident response planning, critical incident management support, emergency plans and business continuity processes to support core activity.



This means major incident planning, exercising/testing and training staff to respond to reasonably foreseeable incidents and liaising with other partner agencies to provide system resilience.

Tell us about your career background Joined the Royal Air Force in 1995 as a Military Police Officer and lived it for 12 years. I have carried out a variety of managerial roles inclusive of general policing, NVQ Assessor and Instructor, intelligence gathering and

spending the last few years in the Special Investigations Branch (SIB).

Travelled, with work, to Iraq, Kosovo, Germany, Cyprus, Falkland Islands and all over mainland UK. Joined the NHS in 2007 and have held strategic roles within Security/Risk/ Resilience within Primary Care, Acute and latterly mental health secure services with the full range of activities including violence reduction strategies, asset and staff protection programmes, counter terrorism initiatives. emergency incident management and response, amongst others.

In the last few years, developing and diversifying my emergency planning management and business contingency portfolio across the forensic secure service estate in the North West.

What are the best bits about your job? Meeting people, helping people and working with really interesting people. I am a people person. Additionally, nobody ever knows everything, so every day is a new day with differences to it....

What is the highlight of your career so far?

Two really. I was the youngest, in terms of time served and age, officer on my SIB course which I was really proud of and worked really hard to achieve. Secondly I developed the Early Action programme at a previous acute trust I worked with. This entailed working with policing partners to integrate police officers, within a large acute multi-site, working alongside clinical teams within Emergency Departments and Security Teams. It had a measurable impact on frequent flyers, partnership liaison and violence and aggression in specific parts of the Hospital.

This was nationally recognised as an innovative approach and won a national Hospital Security award in 2015.

What did you want to be when you were growing up?

Police Officer and a footballer. Got to do two of them...

## Heart failure clinic gives best chance of survival

#### WE have a new clinic for patients with suspected heart failure to give them the best chance of surviving.

Our service is a dedicated one stop Heart Failure Clinic where patients with new suspected heart failure will have prompt access to Heart Failure Specialist team where appropriate investigations will be carried out and a comprehensive management plan will be put in place.

This service will be in line with recent guidelines and trial data which not only clearly demonstrates improvement and reduction of mortality, but has also shows that this kind of a service is instrumental in reducing the length of stay and readmission rates. Improvement of patient experience is another positive outcome of such services.

Dr Khalid Rashid, said: "We in the team are quite excited and thrilled at the prospects of this new development which would be a welcome addition to an already comprehensive and excellent local cardiology service."

#### What do I need to do to opt-in or out of the permit scheme? Please contact car.parking@cht.nhs.uk

If you are already registered and have a permit you don't need to do anything, changes will be applied automatically.

These changes have been discussed at length with our Membership Council and Staff Management Partnership Forum and we believe this is a fairer approach to setting charges.

The Trust Board never takes the decision to increase car parking charges lightly. Additionally most other local trusts also adopt this approach and our charges are comparable.

## **Big Brief**

#### Here's a round-up from June's Big Brief:

A busy month: some significant progress on performance whilst some areas still require improvement

Safe: Inpatient falls with serious harm peaked at six in the month. The overall percentage of harm free care improved to more than 94%

Effective: # Neck of Femur time to theatre is still not being sustained at the standard level however the remaining elements of performance against guidance was excellent Caring: Just 30% complaints closed within timeframe though overall satisfaction using the Friends & Family test improved to 97%

**Responsive:** We are still struggling to deliver the Emergency Care Standard of 95% within 4hrs, although performance did improve on previous month. In contrast we continue to deliver our Referral to Treatment standards across all specialties

**Workforce:** Vacancies increased in month reflecting some significant new investments this year that have still to be fully recruited

CQUIN (Commissioning for QUality and INovation): On plan to hit 3 out of 4 Q1 targets

#### Financial update

- YTD Deficit of £3.16m against a planned figure of £2.86m this £300k will need recoverina
- Elective inpatient activity below target all other activity achieved target
- Agency spend remains very high at more than £2m each division tasked with reducing spend
- Forecasting year-end deficit of £16.10m
- It's important we do not have a higher deficit
- Why? Because the receipt of £11m funding from the Department of Health relies upon us achieving our planned deficit.
