## Top national award for our team



IT WAS a massive night of celebration when our pioneering dementia and prevention of delirium care was hailed the very best at the HSJ's Patient Safety Awards.

Our team beat off eight other finalists to clinch the top award for Dementia Care at the finals at Manchester Central. Judges hailed our approach of bringing in 6th form student volunteers to work alongside our nurses and doctors saying: "This is great work and should be rolled out nationally." Renee Comerford, said: "It

was surreal, amazing. The whole team is a very proud one! "

Nurse consultant for older people, Barbara Schofield, said: "It was more than winning. What they said about us was great. A lot of work has gone into it and the night was amazing."

Our Director of Nursing Brendan Brown said: "Huge congratulations to the team for winning this award, which is a reflection of the hard work, crossboundary working and engagement the team have undertaken in meeting their unlimited potential in the best interests of patients and their families." The awards are hosted by Health Service Journal and Nursing Times and this year saw fierce competition for each of these coveted awards with over 650 submissions, of which only 170 made it to the final cut.

In their ruling, the judges said:
"The evidence is clear that keeping older people mobile, free from pain, hydrated, well slept and free from infection while they are in hospital reduces the risk of them developing delirium in hospital.

"They recover better and are more likely to return home."

## **Tributes to brave Kate**

Kate, born at HRI, had battled cancer for several years but throughout her treatment was a total inspiration promoting her "Hello My Name Is... campaign" for all NHS staff.

## One of the best in region

AFTER a great deal of hard work from all members of the multidisciplinary team the stroke team have managed to improve their SSNAP score (Sentinel Stroke National Audit Programme) from a D to a B; which puts us second in the Yorks and Humber region after Scunthorpe General Hospital.

The turnaround has been due to introducing new ways of working to make the service better for our

patients provided by tremendous team spirit on the unit.

Stroke Clinical Lead Dr Pratap Rana said: "Our nurses are working round the clock delivering thrombolysis and are under immense pressure and cope very well. This is a much better, streamlined service for our patients and their families and we are delighted to see this recognised in our new care rating in the National Audit."

## Innovative discharging boost

WARD managers have risen to a challenge given to them by Associate Director of Nursing, Tracy Fennell and Deputy Associate Director of Nursing, Gemma Berriman.

As a part of the Safer Patient Flow Programme, they were asked to test new and innovative ways of planning discharges to help patients go home in the morning rather than waiting until the afternoon.

Whilst some of the wards haven't fully implemented changes, the proportion of discharges which happen before midday has risen to 20% across the Trust, with some wards exceeding the 40% target that the Trust has set.

## **Big Brief**

#### Here's a round-up from July's Big Brief:

**Safe:** Inpatient falls with serious harm increased - action plan in place as part of CQUIN on safety huddles. Improvement in overall PPH rates – keep up the good work

**Effective:** There were three cases of C Diff in May – Really important to keep up good practice on hand hygiene

**Caring:** A slight increase in complaints closed within timeframe to 38% - focus divisionally to improve performance further

**Responsive:** We are 2nd only to Harrogate in performance of our Emergency Care Standard despite a drop in performance in May to 93.47%. We are also seeing real improvements in morning discharges

**Workforce:** Sickness absence at lowest position for more than 12 months, though return to work interviews still need focus

**CQUIN (Commissioning for QUality and INovation):** On plan to hit 3 out of 4 Q1 targets with a new prompt in EDIS at triage for Sepsis

#### Financial Performance – May (Month 2)

- YTD Deficit of £5.87m against a planned figure of £5.81m we will need to recover this variance to come back in line with our planned deficit
  - Agency spend in May £2.5m
- Forecasting year-end deficit of £16.10m
  - It's important we do not have a higher deficit than this and we work to contain agency spend
  - Why? Because the receipt of £11m funding from the Department of Health relies upon us achieving our planned deficit, achieving key targets and reducing agency spend

#### Cost improvement programme (CIP)

- Month 2: Delivered £1.26m against target of £1.24m
- Forecast: Forecasting £14m at year end
